Trinity Church supports The Farming Community Network (FCN), who help families in farming, and I would say this year they may well have to help more than ever due to rising energy costs, fuel and food and with what might be a poor harvest for them. If you want to see what the FCN is about then you can visit the website Farming Community Network - Farming Community Network (fcn.org.uk) So I stop and think as I walk through the fields around our village and pray that the farmers can make ends meet this year.

# **Haven First**

As is our custom in Trinity, we are supporting the work of Haven First at Harvest time. The charity has been supporting homeless people in the local community for more than 30 years, starting as a winter night shelter. In 2015 the work moved into a purpose-built hostel, where clients are provided with an en-suite bedroom and three meals a day. There is access to counselling, training programmes and administrative support, all helping to prepare for independent living. An outreach support worker seeks to find the right help for rough sleepers. The charity's mission is to provide a secure future for all clients.

Gifts for the charity will be collected at our Harvest Service on September 11th, and Gift Aid envelopes will be available.

# Message from Rev'd Malcolm Peacock

This will be the last Newsletter I write for the Circuit, we will be moving to South Wales on August 8<sup>th</sup>. It seems strange to me for consultations to be happening without me. Yet despite my feeling of strangeness, I am happy that I am seeing the Church at work in a very clear way.

Methodism, like all denominations, has some aspects that are good and others that can feel a cause of frustration. One of the strengths, and perhaps also a frustration, is the importance of conferring and consulting to discern the will of God. It isn't one or two people who alone know what the will of God, the whole of the membership is involved in consultation and from the views of the whole the will of God and the direction that the Spirit of God is taking the Church. I am confident that as a Circuit we will discern where God is leading, and we will be shown the most effective way in which we can engage with building the Kingdom of God.


