PASTORAL CARE NEWS

Josie Viles

We received news of the recent death of Josie Viles. Those of us who were members when Trinity Church was formed in 1996 remember Josie, wife of David who was then URC Minister at Park Lane. David continued alongside Bob Forrest (then the New Close Methodist Minister) until his retirement in January 1999. David and Josie then returned to settle back in their hometown of St Ives (Cambs.) where her life was celebrated and remembered this November 1st at St Ives Free Church (where they had also married). Brian and I attended and took messages from others to David after the service.

Josie and David met at school and remained a couple through her training as a teacher and David's for ministry in the Congregational Church. They celebrated both Golden and Diamond Anniversaries in retirement, with their family including daughter Lydia, son John and his wife Grainne, and their three grandchildren Ben, Finn and Abi. In recent years Josie faced her diagnosis of Parkinson's disease with much courage and determination and support from family and local care resources to keep life as active as possible. David's deep sadness is clear, as also is his appreciation of the family and care support that surrounds him.

In Knebworth we knew them for a chapter of their life, and I appreciate the part they both played in the chapter which transitioned from two fellowships in Knebworth to the formation of the LEP which has passed its silver anniversary already! I also remember Josie as a someone who was fully involved as a member of the church in worship and social events and as David's devoted wife, but she helped us in recognising the boundaries that must exist in what is expected of other family members of a serving minister. It is hard to realise how much (in previous generations) there could almost be an expectation of "buy one get one free". Josie's personal life in Knebworth included volunteering in the charity shop and working part time in a local school for children with additional emotional and educational needs. It was clear from those we heard at her thanksgiving service, and from the eulogy, that Josie lived out her Christian faith throughout nearly nine decades with kindness, courage, humour and a tangible appreciation of others in her life, especially David and their family. David asked us to bring his greetings back to Trinity Church members, and we assure him of our ongoing prayers. Gill Hughes

Pastoral Care Relaunch

I am excited that we have finally relaunched our pastoral care network. In October we held the first open meeting – we plan to hold a couple a year so all can be involved in conversation about what we try to achieve and how we can best do so. We will be grateful for your suggestions for what might be included – and when is a good time to hold meetings. It can be a sharing of our needs for training, ways to access support – within and beyond Trinity - and constructively sharing our general experience (but not of course personal details of others).

Members of the fellowship should have heard – or very soon hear – from the member of the Pastoral Care Team who is their "PC Contact". This is not a closed link excluding others who are already (or may become) part of each of our networks of support and care. It ensures though, that we each have a known link person for connection. If you have not yet heard from your contact please let me know and we will do our best to resolve that.

One of the aspects of life (church life being no exception) is that communication can be very holey (NB not a spelling error). We can think everyone has been told something, we can think it is clear, we can be sure we did say it / write it / sort it – what we cannot be sure of is that the other party read it / heard it / received it in the way we knew we meant. In our busy lives we can read (or write) something quickly and not go back to review it and absorb it. We can include ambiguity in what we say.... This is real life. But the result can be unrecognised misunderstandings, disconnections, and sometimes painful perceptions.

In relaunching our pastoral care network I would really like to work at eliminating those gaps in connection – encourage people to ask if they think they have been left out, or they have an anxiety about what it all means. No question is off limits. One of the big keys to unlock the misunderstandings is rooted in opportunities for good conversation – much damage was sustained to conversation by the pandemic, I only hope we can repair it well. If you want to better understand the importance of conversation, I highly recommend an interview, "How to talk", published in September Reform (a few copies are available in Trinity entrance). It was the basis of our discussion starters at the Pastoral Care meeting and gives valuable insights for us all into good listening skills.

In a recent café service in Trinity, Kate involved the children in an activity creating a paper chain with names (not surnames) of many in our fellowship – whether present in worship or not. It echoes to some extent the names we mention regularly in our "pray this week for...." Sunday notice. The chain remains (at least for a while) as a tangible image of how we are each unique to God but linked together, working and supporting in Christ's name as God's church in community and world. A paper chain is not just for Christmas!

Please share in the relaunch in whatever ways you can – feedback, questions, suggestions – but most of all by engaging in and encouraging conversations, small, medium and large. Do share any personal concerns with me or any member of the Pastoral Care Team – a list was available in the papers for the September Church Meeting, or I can supply one.

Her love and appreciation of the natural world manifested itself in many ways. A keen and knowledgeable gardener, she loved tending her plants in her Oakfields garden, and on several occasions I encountered her there, sitting beside Jack, just relaxing and enjoying their lovely surroundings. With the move to Constance Place, her balcony became her 'garden', and always looked attractive with pot plants and seasonal blooms.

Kay and Jack were the first residents in Constance Place , having chosen an attractive apartment which afforded a view over the school field – they enjoyed watching the children at play. They were able to welcome future residents and help them settle in.

Kay loved the great outdoors and we had many interesting conversations, helped along by photograph albums, about our mutual love of the Lake District - walks enjoyed, challenges along the way and the triumph of scaling a mountain! We agreed that it was a privilege to pass on these pleasures to the next generation and beyond. Kay shared her experiences of spending some of her childhood in that area, a time which included visits to Hilltop in Sawrey, to be in the company of Beatrix Potter.

Visits to Kay invariably included the sharing of news of our respective families, and it was apparent just how significant visits from family members, both near and far, and family celebrations were to her.

Kay's warm, empathetic personality endeared her to many, and I count it a privilege to have known her.

Where can we find God?

Recently I attended a service in a church outside our circuit, and the message from the preacher was - we must find God in the supernatural and the miraculous. However, Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote to the effect that if one cannot find God in the ordinary then one will not find Him in the extraordinary. With that I agree, so Jesus pointed to a woman making bread, a farmer sowing seed, a stranger assisting a man attacked by robbers. The writer of the 1st Epistle of John writes: 'Beloved let us love one another, because love is from God, everyone who loves is born of God and knows God.'

Let me give an example - on a Sunday earlier this year, there gathered a large team of medics, including top consultants and nurses, all giving of their time in order to enable a sister to give her younger sister a gift - her womb! For the younger sister had no womb, but did have an ovary so she had eggs stored. Thanks to a charity, which funded the operation, this woman will likely become a mother.

Surely, a display of love from the older sister and the whole medical team.

There is another side to this story when one considers should women feel it necessary to bear children to satisfy the compelling desire, or could they accept the situation and sublimate the drive, and consider the children already born, but have no family to care for them? My mother never conceived or bore a child, but thanks to her love and that of my father, I was adopted, and moved from London, which was being nightly bombed, to the North of England away from the main areas that were then being attacked. We need to be alert to find God and the working of His Spirit wherever true love and service exist.

I leave you with the lovely hymn by George Wade Robinson, which you can listen to on YouTube!

Loved with everlasting love, Led by grace that love to know; Spirit, breathing from above, Thou hast taught me this is so. O this full and perfect peace! O this transport all divine! In a love which cannot cease I am his and he is mine.

ARTICLE FOR THE JANUARY 2024 ISSUE OF THE PARISH NEWS BY REV. JOHN WHITTLE:

'Gentlemen may cry, Peace, Peace - but there is no peace'

How can you sleep at night when the world would seem to be nearer World War 3 than ever since 1945? (that is how it seems as I write this in November!). How can you sleep if you are surrounded by problems of lack of finance, of worry over family members, or friends? I can only suggest something I have practised over the years - breathe in slowly through the nose, and then exhale via the mouth, and at the same time in rhythm with the breathing, repeat verses of scripture or of hymns. For example - from Isaiah 26 v.3f. 'Thou wilt keep him/her in perfect peace, whose mind is staid on Thee, because s/he trusts in the Lord, trust in the Lord always for our God is an everlasting rock'. This may lead into a verse of 'Rock of Ages, cleft for me let me hide myself in Thee'.

I cannot help but feel that the Jewish lady-hostage who, on release, turned back to her captor and shook his hand, knew God's peace in her heart. She had worked for peace with her Palestinian neighbours over many years. All religions have suffered from the sins of revenge and pride, leading to violent attitudes towards others, who are seen as inferior, or even as non-humans. Christianity has had its wars of conquest, involving forced conversions; the Jewish Scriptures speak of wars of conquest and violent repression; likewise in Islam. Thankfully, all too have had a more positive teaching of tolerance, generosity and peaceful living. Alas, so often, it is the former, who shout loudest and drown out the calls for peace. I referred to the Jewish lady who found peace in her faith, Christians not only have the same source as her but, in addition, rejoice in the birth of the Prince of Peace, who is seen as forecast in Islaih 9 v.6. His birth is heralded by the angels 'Glory to God in the Highest, peace on earth, goodwill to all'. Some of Jesus's final words to his disciples were 'Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid.'

Throughout this New Year may you sleep well, and continue to pray and work for peace for your neighbours and for the world.

Prayer - 'We pray for peace, but not the easy peace built on complacency and not the truth of God. We pray for real peace, the peace God's love alone can seal. God, give us peace; if you withdraw your love there I no peace for us, nor any hope of it. With you to lead us on, through death or tumult, peace will come' (Alan Gaunt) John

Following lunch we had a craft session led by Jenny Spouge to prepare a new board for our entrance hall. We talked about our hopes for the world and community and wrote them on paper seeds, which we planted in the soil. Over the coming weeks and months we hope to add to these and watch them grow roots and stems as we put our faith into action. Please do put your thoughts onto seeds we have hung along the bottom of the display. It was a thought provoking day where we enjoyed fellowship and were encouraged to look to the future with Christian hope.



MISSION AND CHARITY NEWS

Advent letter from the Thames North Synod Moderator, Rev. George Watt



November 2023

Dear friends,

It feels like everyone is getting ready, getting ready for Christmas. Christmas trees going up (even as I write!), cards being written, presents being bought, menus being planned and food being bought. Although sadly, and increasingly, for some they are not able to prepare to celebrate and certainly not in the way they might have hoped. They have a deep concern as to how they can simply heat their homes and feed their families this winter. That is if they even have a home to live and eat in.

In the past I have had the privilege of volunteering at a winter night shelter. What struck me was that everyone's story was different as to how they found themselves homeless. It taught me not to make assumptions. Some had been estranged from their families, got behind with their rents and evicted, couldn't afford to put together a deposit despite working, experienced broken relationships and so the stories could go on.

Some churches will be hosting winter night shelters, arranging warm hubs and providing hot drinks and meals to not just those who are homeless, but also to the lonely and vulnerable. As Christians we cannot close our eyes and ears to the needs around us as we prepare to celebrate Christmas. We cannot welcome Jesus and shun our neighbour. As Jesus himself said 'Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'

The nature of Jesus' birth highlights who these brothers and sisters are. Jesus himself was born homeless with parents who were dependent on the charity of others to give them shelter and food. The story worsens as the family had to flee and become refugees in Egypt. Yes, Jesus was a refugee! When we fail to look out for those in need, we are hurting God.

Today our hearts and the heart of God is breaking looking at what is happening in the place of Jesus' birth. The violence and suffering in Israel and Palestine makes us stop and think, pray and act even as we prepare for Christmas. In our sanitised Christmas we usually miss out the story of the massacre of the innocents just after Jesus's birth which is recounted in Matthew's Gospel. But we can't turn a blind eye to the massacre of the innocents in the current conflict.

Martin Leckebusch in his variant of a popular carol, 'O West Bank town of Bethlehem', asks the question:

'How violently, how violently the hope of peace is riven; can God impart to these torn hearts the blessings of his heaven ? Who now recalls his coming to this dark world of sin?'

As Christians we believe that peace is possible, the hungry can be fed and the homeless find shelter. And we can work together to achieve it and thus truly remember and celebrate the God who came to earth as a baby to transform a troubled world.

I would like to wish you a peaceful Christmas as you celebrate and seek to play your part in bringing about transformation in this world.


