MESSAGE ON PENTECOST FROM REVD STAN

THE POWER OF THE PENTECOST

The subject of the Holy Spirit is hardly talked about or taught because of the many reasons such as the misunderstanding of how it works today in the church. But we celebrate **PENTECOST** which is characterised by the beginning and the formation of the church through the powerful evangelistic program of the fearless disciples endowed by the Holy Ghost. The fearful and timid disciples who had closed themselves up in the Upper Room, now opened the doors, speaking in tongues to the surprise of bystanders. Ps104:30 says, "You sent out your spirit and they are created, and you renew the face of the earth". When the Holy Spirit came "the disciples were recreated", it was a rebirth or a renewal that changed the face of the earth.

HOW THE HOLY SPIRIT WORKED IN JESUS CHRIST

From the beginning the immaculate conception of Christ was through the Holy Spirit, a fact that denies the human paternity and an affirmation that His coming was the work of the mysterious power of God. According to Mk 1:12, The Holy spirit was the power that drove Jesus Christ into the wilderness and also the power that drove out demons and enabled him to do various miracles (Lk 11:20; Matt 12:28). As he was nearing his end of ministry Jesus appeared to be the dispenser of the Holy Spirit to the followers and the entire church (Lk 24:49) and is given as the comforter/helper (Jn 14:17,26). Therefore, the Holy Spirit is the divine and heavenly dynamic force given to those who believe, the body of Jesus Christ (the Church) apportioned to each member of the church.

PURPOSE OF THE HOLY SPIRIT IN THE CHURCH

- 1. Christ had earlier taught that the Holy Spirit would **teach the disciples** what to say (LK12:12) which shows the mysteries of God upon those who believe.
- 2. As the Holy Spirit manifested itself upon the disciples and they became **witnesses** after being transformed (Acts 2:3-4)
- 3. The Holy Spirit **inspires prophecy** (Acts 13:9-11), **gives wisdom** (Acts 6:3); **gives encouragement** when one is discouraged (Acts 9:31); it **enhances faith** (Acts 6:5), where it reveals and searches out the deep revelations of God (Gal 3:5; 1 Cor 14:14-16).
- 4. The Holy Spirit enables **Christians to pray** (Rom 8:15, 26: 1 Cor 12:3; Gal4:6).

- 5. The Holy Spirit is the **principle by which Christians live a life worthy of the Christian believer** (Gal 5:5).
- 6. The Holy Spirit **awakens love** in the Christian (Rom 5:5; Col1:8) and is the **principle of the mutual love** of Christians (Rom 15:30)
- 7. The Holy Spirit is **the paraclete- the spirit of truth** (Jn 14:17) which is the continuing life of the church
- 8. However, in Eph 3:16f, the Holy Spirit is given as the power of the growth of the church.

REMEMBERING CONSTANCE JOYCE JAMES – "Joy" 13th December 1931 – 4th March 2025

It was with much sadness that we learned of the death of Joy on March 4th. During her stay for the past two to three years at Jubilee Court in Stevenage, close to where her son Glyn lives, she enjoyed visits from members and friends from the church delivering "Trinity Quarterly". Joy with her husband David had become members of the United Reformed Church in Knebworth many years ago when they had moved to Welwyn from Brookmans Park where they had also belonged to the URC.

David became an Elder and Joy joined in all the activities that happened in those times. The opportunity to return to their native Wales came when their house in Welwyn was purchased by the Department of Transport for an A1M widening scheme, and they retired to Aberystwyth.

After Joy was widowed she made frequent visits back to Knebworth waiting for her house in Aberystwyth to be sold. Eventually she was able to move to a small house in Stevenage and come back to Trinity.

Joy had always kept in contact with her many friends over the years with long newsletters, holiday postcards and visits. While living and working abroad in their early married life Joy and David had met and become friends with Lloyd James and his wife, maintaining the friendship over the years after returning to the UK and Lloyd settling in the U.S.A, where his son and daughter were born. The American family still visited England as both Lloyd and his wife had close family links in Welwyn Garden City. It was on one such visit that Lloyd, now a widower and Joy decided to marry, to the delight of their families.

However after living in Joy's house in Stevenage they decided to move to a larger house, choosing one in Aberystwyth where family and friends visited over more than ten years and they enjoyed a happy life together making new friends and meeting up with family members again.

Unfortunately Lloyd became ill with cancer and died during the pandemic the following year. Helped through the early months of widowhood by her son Martyn who supported her in her home it was decided that she should move nearer to her sons Glyn and Gavin in Stevenage and Hatfield. Her initial short-term stay was at Lowe House in Knebworth before moving to Jubilee Court in Stevenage. In the last year she had been able to watch on a small screen in her room when her grand-daughter got married in Malta, and then last August she was able to celebrate Glyn's wedding to Magda.

A very happy final year in a long a fulfilled life.

A Journey to Remember - 7th May 2024




It's our 1st Anniversary in the UK

Frances Jane Crosby was born on March 24, 1820, in the village of Brewster, about 50 miles north of New York City. She was the only child of John Crosby and his second wife Mercy Crosby. At six weeks old Jane, later known as Fanny, caught a cold and developed inflammation of the eyes. Mustard poultices were applied to treat the discharges. According to Fanny, this procedure damaged her optic nerves and blinded her, but modern physicians think that her blindness was more likely congenital and, given her age, may simply not have been noticed by her parents. Her father died in November 1820, when Fanny was only six months old, so she was mother, and maternal raised her

These women grounded her in Christian principles, helping her memorize long passages from the Bible, and she became an active member of the John Street Methodist Episcopal Church in Manhattan. When she was three, the family moved to North Salem, New York, where Eunice had been raised. In April 1825, she was examined by the surgeon, who concluded that her condition was inoperable and that her blindness was permanent. At age eight, she wrote her first poem which described her condition. She later stated: "It seemed intended by the blessed providence of God, that I should be blind all my life, and I thank him for the dispensation. If perfect earthly sight were offered me tomorrow I would not accept it. I might not have sung hymns to the praise of God if I had been distracted by the beautiful and interesting things about me. According to biographer Annie Willis, "had it not been for her affliction she might not have received so good an education, or have so great an influence, and certainly not so fine a memory". Fanny memorized five chapters of the Bible each week from the age of 10, with the encouragement of her grandmother, so by the age of 15, she had memorized the four gospels, the first five books of the Old Testament, the Book of Proverbs, the Song of Solomon, and many of the Psalms. From 1832, a music teacher came to her home twice a week to give singing lessons to her, and some of the other children. Around the same time, she attended her first Methodist church services at the Methodist Episcopal Church, and she was delighted by their hymns.

Fanny enrolled at the New York Institution for the Blind in 1835, just before her 15th birthday. She remained there for eight years as a student, and another two years as a graduate pupil, during which time she learned to play the piano, organ, harp, and guitar, and became a good soprano singer. While she was studying at NYIB, her mother Mercy remarried, and the couple had three children together. However, six years later Mercy's husband abandoned her and the family.

After graduation from the NYIB in 1843, she joined a group of lobbyists in

<u>Washington D.C.</u>, arguing for support of education for the blind. She was the first woman to speak in the <u>United States Senate</u>, when she read a poem there. She appeared before the joint houses of Congress and recited these lines:

O ye, who here from every state convene, Illustrious band! May we not hope the scene You now behold will prove to every mind Instruction hath a ray to cheer the blind.

In 1858 Fanny met Alexander van Alstyne Jr. He also was blind and enrolled at the NYIB, where he was a casual acquaintance of Fanny, and sometimes a student in her classes. He was a teacher at NYIB for two years from 1855; during this time, the couple were engaged to be married, necessitating her resignation from NYIB three days prior to their wedding at Maspeth, New York, on March 5, 1858. After their wedding, the van Alstynes lived in a small home in the rural village of Maspeth, New York, population of about 200 people.

At her husband's insistence, Fanny continued to use her maiden name as her literary name, but she chose to use her married name on all legal documents. However, according to biographer Edith Blumhofer: "Despite her education, her handwriting was barely legible, and on legal documents she signed her name with an X witnessed by friends".[179]

In 1859, the van Alstynes had a daughter named Frances, who died in her sleep soon after birth. Some believe that the cause was <u>typhoid fever</u>, and that the hymn "**Safe in the Arms of Jesus"** was inspired by her death.

For many years, the van Alstynes had "a most unusual married life", and lived together only intermittently. By 1880, they had separated, living both separately and independently due to a rift in their marriage of uncertain origin. At one point soon after, Fanny moved to a "dismal flat" at 9 Frankfort Street, near one of Manhattan's worst slums in the Lower Eastern Side. Despite living separately for more than two decades, Fanny insisted that they "maintained an amiable relationship", kept in contact with one another, and even ministered together on occasions in this period. Her only recorded admission of marital unhappiness was in 1903, when she commented once that her husband: "He had his faults—and so have I mine, but notwithstanding these, we loved each other to the last". In 1880, aged 60, Crosby "made a new commitment to Christ to serve the poor and to devote the rest of her life to home missionary work". She continued to live in a dismal flat at 9 Frankfort Street, near one of the worst slums in Manhattan, until about 1884, and from this time, she increased her involvement in various missions and homes.

Crosby died at Bridgeport of <u>arteriosclerosis</u> and a <u>cerebral haemorrhage</u> on February 12th 1915, following a six-month illness, aged 94. She was buried at <u>Mountain Grove Cemetery</u> in Bridgeport. near her mother and other members of her family. Her family erected a very small <u>tombstone</u> at her request which carried the words: "Aunt Fanny: She hath done what she could; Fanny J. Crosby".

The response to Peter's simple sermon is amazing; over 3,000 people repent and believe. The followers start meeting together, the first church. They are like a family and their openness, distinctiveness and love lead others to join them. From these early beginnings, the good news of the gospel, Christ's death and resurrection spread throughout the world and through history.

August Mission of the month focus on Orphans in Zimbabwe



In my previous article a couple of months ago I talked about the orphans in Zimbabwe, and I am happy to let you know that our Mission Group has decided that the month of August shall be dedicated to the Orphans in Zimbabwe.

- 1. The boys have requested decent clothing, cell phones and laptops and they wear shoes size 7 and 8 and clothes 32 to 34 respectively. We intend to collect the items here at church, and we will arrange a way that we will have the items reach Zimbabwe. We have 6 boys in total.
- 2. Milan Tasunungurwa is struggling with upkeep money during the semester break as he has no known relatives and is staying at our home in Chirumhanzu during the holidays. He requires at least £80 per year, (Clothing, Laptop and Cell phone) He is currently at MSU in second year doing Supply Chain and Management
- 3. Brandon Muganhiri is currently in second year at MSU, and he is doing Human Resource Management *(Clothing, Laptop and Cell phone)*
- 4. Wilderness Nyirenda is currently in third year at MSU, and on attachment doing Supply Chain and Management. (Clothing, Laptop and Cell phone)
- 5. Nyasha Runodada fourth year student at MSU, doing Radio and Television (Clothing, Laptop and a Cell Phone)
- 6. Brandon Chinyanga is our most recent graduate who is at Ruwa rehab centre due to drug and substance abuse (He requires at least £350 to enable him to complete his six months rehabilitation program and clothing, a phone to help him look for a job after he is released). He is one of the boys who has no known relatives and grew up in the home since birth.

If you feel moved to support this just cause, please do not hesitate to talk to Maureen or myself for more details. If you feel persuaded to support one child our prayers will be answered. Just to know that they are loved will make a huge difference to them. It is our desire to see the boys finish school and they are currently struggling with these basics. Their fees and tuition are all paid by our Partner church in USA and unfortunately their budget is only enough to cover their fees and boarding fees during term time.

Thanks to everyone who took part in the Walk, it was a strong demonstration of our faith and of the importance of the Easter message. Thanks also to the St Thomas More "caterers" for ensuring that we rounded off the event in an appropriate manner!

Christian Aid Report

This is the 80th anniversary of Christian Aid, an organisation which was born out of the sufferings and displacement of people caused by WWII, and still finds itself facing the same kinds of needs caused by the same warmongering and gross injustices as those that led to its establishment, but made worse by the realities of climate change, which seems to be hitting the poorer world communities more than the rest of the nations.

Knebworth Christian Aid Committee, which has existed, I estimate, for some 50 years, founded by people like Alan Richardson, Ken Emsdon, Michael Lucas, and later included Saxon & Yvonne Denning, Hilary Dyster and Pat Peters, has worked to support the various projects which Christian Aid has initiated across the globe.

We heard of one such project from Annabelle Grassini at the Frugal Lunch held at St Martin's Parish Centre on April 27th. **Over £400 was raised for the CA Sudan appeal.** She spoke of the work being done in South Sudan, where there is conflict not only in that nation but also in its northern neighbour Sudan. The result is an influx of refugees from the north as well as displaced citizens of South Sudan.

An issue in South Sudan of which I was unaware is one highlighted in a recent publication from Christian Aid, is that of flooding. It tells the story of Grace from Kenya, who one night heard her neighbours screaming: 'Get out! Water is coming!' She and her children escaped, but her home was swept away and she lost her small grocery business. Christian Aid's partner in Kenya CREAW has offered food and counselling and is hopeful of helping her to start up a new grocery business. Similar stories of flooding come from Libya (2023: 20,000 dead or missing or injured) and Bangladesh (2024: 4.6.million impacted with 800,000 displaced).

Christian Aid believes in working in partnership using people who understand the local contexts and champion solutions that are designed and led locally. It seeks too, to help communities build their resilience by training farmers to use resilient farming techniques that will protect their crops. And by supporting people to develop new income streams to enable them to build homes that better resist extremes of weather.

It is only thanks to your support, that in 2024 Christian Aid offered humanitarian aid to 3.1 million people, and we must be ready to face the challenges of 2025 by being resourced and ready to act.

RECIPE CORNER

ROSEMARY'S GINGER LOG

Ingredients

- 1-2 packets of ginger biscuits or other hard biscuits
- 1-2 tablespoons sherry (undiluted orange juice could be substituted)

A small pot of double cream whipped (let it warm up before whipping) then put back in fridge.

Decorations: whipped cream, oranges, raspberries, strawberries or blueberries or grated chocolate. If using tinned fruit put on just before serving.

Method

Cover a long dish, platter or chopping board with foil and cut a small piece of foil and place on work surface.

Lay out your ingredients, a small spoon and a pastry brush ready for use (once you start you need to be quick).

Quickly, either dip first biscuit into the liquid or using a pastry brush lightly apply liquid. Then place damp side down onto the small piece of foil.

Put a teaspoon or so of cream on to the other side. Repeat using about 5 biscuits to make a small stack and place them on their edges on the platter.

Now repeat, stacking a few at a time, the idea is to make a long shape with the biscuits stuck together on their edges.

Decorate the top with cream, fruit or grated chocolate

Store in the fridge and consume within 24 hours.

Sorry this is not gluten free but perhaps can be adapted. Hope it works out it is some time since I made it.


